My first connection point with FoDU's work was the sport for development aspects of the mission. As a huge sports fan and someone who realized the power that team sports (baseball and basketball in my case) had on me throughout my life, I was immediately drawn to how FoDU was using soccer to make a lifelong impact on the children we served.

HYGIENE KIT DISTRIBUTION

It was an incridible joy for our organization to touch base with all of our partner schools and post-primary students during the month of March and pass out this year's hygiene kits. We cannot express to you the joy and honor that it is to look each of these brave young women in the eye as we affirm their worth and encourage them in their struggles as each item is dropped into their hygiene bags.

Our first hygiene kits were passed out in 2014, and we have since added a few more needed items such as nail clippers, brushes, mirrors, and washcloths, but the essence of these kits remains the same. We are meeting a real need in the lives of these young women, and in turn eleviating the finacial burden that these girls often feel like to their families. They get to use these kits as a bargaining chip for their future, and the joy and excitement is hard to put into words.

Over the past twelve years of placing these items into the grateful hands of our girls, we continue to be humbled by just how needed these items are in the lives of our students. One of the most beautiful aspects of

this program is how much our girls now identify themselves as women of SUBSTANCE, and have completely changed how they view themselves.

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


A Word From Our Executive Director
